Hi Tech Teens, a WELL program, is not just another opportunity for teens to get screen time. It is a deliberate opportunity for them to understand and explore what is behind the screen. Students work with mentors – young, successful students at NCSU and many currently working in the field of Computer Science – to complete project-based learning activities focused on designing, coding, and building websites, games and applications.

In addition, Hi Tech Teens specifically recruits girls and minorities as participants to change the trajectory of computer science away from being a white, male-dominated career field. By learning the basics of computer programming and practicing presentation skills, these students are opening up options to explore a wealth of career opportunities in computer science and technology.

A typical Y Learning program runs for 31 weeks of the 36 week academic school year. Program participants will enjoy a snack, individualized tutoring and age-appropriate activities for a total program time of 2.5 – 3 hours per day.
